

Rutgers University-Rutgers School of Health Related Professions- This is a joint program between Rutgers School of Health Related Professions and Abraham Clark High School to allow students to gain valuable college credits and clinical experience to prepare them for a career in the health field. Students take four courses in a sequence as part of the Health Occupations Program at Abraham Clark High School and receive clinical experience in health care settings and also obtain tuition free college credits with Rutgers. These credits can be applied to any college or university of their choice post- graduation from high school if the students are successful in their academic grades and fulfills the requirements of the university and school district. Students are required to pass course work at the high school, take the required final examination and also complete community service hours to participate in the nationally acclaimed program. The following courses are offered in conjunction with Rutgers School of Health Related Professions:

- **Dynamics of Health Care in Society/Health Occupations-3 College credits**

This course allows students the unique opportunity to gain over 180 hours of clinical experience in three different health care settings during the school year and gain college credits with Rutgers University School of Health Related Professions.

- **Emergency & Clinical Care 2 College credits**

Students also gain CPR and AED certification as part of this course.

- **Anatomy & Physiology I- 4 College credits**

- **Medical Math- 3 College credits**

- **Medical Terminology- 3 College credits**

Union County College - Through a partnership with Union County College and Abraham Clark High School students are able to take college courses during the extended school day after school, or during the summer months. During the recent summer of 2015 the 70 hour Pharmacy Technician Course was offered free of charge due to a grant TAACCT-NJPREP. This 5 week program was offered to students who were 18 years old or older and it covered the cost of the instructor and the textbook. Taking the course allows students the opportunity to be prepared to take the state and national examinations to become nationally certified in this growing health professions.

Kean University- This is a joint program with Kean University and Abraham Clark High School that helps prepare students for a career in the field of Teaching. Students attend workshops at Kean University along with taking courses at Abraham Clark High School to prepare them to become teachers. No college credit is offered through this program.
